

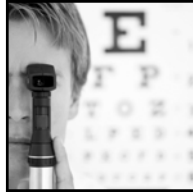
Did You Know...

Age-Related Macular Degeneration

Affects the part of the retina responsible for sharp, central vision. Risk factors include: age, race and smoking.

Diabetic Retinopathy

Commonly caused by diabetes. It involves abnormal growth of retinal blood vessels that may leak, break down or become blocked.



Cataracts

The clouding of the eye's naturally clear lens. Risk factors include: exposure to UV rays, age, diet, smoking and alcohol consumption.

Glaucoma

Involves optical nerve damage that causes the permanent loss of peripheral vision. Risk factors include: age, race, diabetes, eye injury and certain

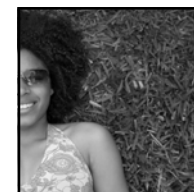

Protect Your Sight

- **Eat healthy**-research has shown that certain vitamins and minerals such as lutein and vitamins A and C may help prevent vision loss due to AMD and cataracts.
- **Exercise regularly**-you will not only feel better and have more energy, but physical activity can also help to reduce the risk of Type II Diabetes.
- **Avoid smoking**-cigarette smoking can increase the chances of developing AMD and other eye diseases.
- **Have a Regular Exam**-a regular eye exam by an eye care professional can help to detect any vision changes or eye diseases.
- **Wear Sunglasses**-they help protect your eyes from the sun's damaging UV rays. Long-term exposure to UV rays can lead to cataracts, AMD or skin cancer around the eyes.
